FYUGP Regulations: Framing of Curriculum, Regulations and Syllabus for commencing Four Year Under Graduate Programme from the academic year 2024-2025 in line with NEP 2020

Gender Audit: As part of its commitment to fostering gender equality and inclusivity, the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) organized a Gender Audit in the University during the academic year 2023-24. Conducted from January 9 to 12, 2024, the audit was led by an expert team comprising Dr. Layana S. Aanand (Assistant Professor, Department of Women's Studies, University of Calicut), Dr. Asha Achy Joseph (Dean, SH School of Communication, Sacred Heart College), and Sri. K.C. Santhosh Kumar (Gender Consultant, KILA). The audit process involved a comprehensive schedule covering all university sections, departments, and members, with various interactive sessions held to gather insights and ensure thorough evaluation. The team successfully completed the audit and submitted their findings for further action, reinforcing the university's commitment to gender equality and improvement.

HSSTP: The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), in collaboration with the Department of Higher Secondary Education, Kerala, successfully organized a Higher Secondary School Teachers Transformation Program (HSSTP). This training program, facilitated by the Departments of English, Sanskrit Sahitya, Hindi, and Sociology, aimed to enhance the pedagogical skills and subject expertise of higher secondary school teachers. By fostering knowledge exchange and professional growth, this initiative underscores IQAC's commitment to strengthening the quality of education and building impactful collaborations with the wider educational community.

International student exchange regulations: Regulations for Academic Collaborations with Foreign Higher Educational Institutions has been framed regarding the admission of foreign students and Student Exchange in the University, in accordance with the UGC norms and the Office of International Affairs has been established for further activities

Memorandums of Understanding: In the academic year 2023-2024, the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) spearheaded the signing of multiple Memorandums of Understanding (MoUs) with prestigious institutions to enhance academic and research opportunities. Key collaborations include an MoU with the Central University of Hyderabad for teaching, research, and training initiatives, and an MoU with the Kerala Development and Innovation Strategic Council (KDISC) to develop skill-based courses. An MoU with GeoHazard Society, New Delhi, was established to promote academic, research, and consultancy efforts in disaster management. Additionally, an MoU with the Kerala Council for Historical Research (KCHR) facilitates the publication of source materials under the Kalady Historical Series. The partnership with the Centre for Textual Studies and Publications (CTSP) of Kottakkal Arya Vaidyasala focuses on collaborative research and publication activities, reflecting the university's commitment to interdisciplinary growth and innovation.

16. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit (SSUS) exemplifies the epitome of a multidisciplinary approach in higher education, offering a diverse array of courses that blend traditional Sanskrit studies with modern disciplines. Established with the vision of preserving and propagating the rich heritage of Sanskrit and Indic knowledge systems, SSUS has evolved into a hub of interdisciplinary learning, catering to the evolving needs of students in the contemporary world. SSUS's multidisciplinary approach is its emphasis on integrating Sanskrit studies with other

disciplines. When University opted for the Credit Semester System itself, such courses were included. While shifting to the OBTLE scheme itself, courses with Multi disciplinary & Interdiciplinary contents were included. The institution being a Sanskrit University, through the courses in Sanskrit provide an opportunity for the students acquire knowledge related to courses like Social Sciences, Indian Knowledge Systems, fine arts etc. Each student get the opportunity to take two courses from other departments according to their interest in the period of four semesters in the case of Post Graduate Programmes. 17.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

SSUS is undergoing a transformative endeavor with the implementation of the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) system, set to revolutionize the management of students' academic records. With the formulation of Regulations and Guidelines for the Academic Bank of Credits, the university has already taken a significant step towards ensuring the seamless functioning of this system. By appointing a Nodal Officer to coordinate the operations and serve as a liaison between the University and the NAD, effective communication channels are established. Moreover, the university's proactive approach includes providing comprehensive training sessions for staff members of the examination wing to enable them to upload necessary documents to NAD, thereby empowering students to access their academic records through their ABC accounts. Academic credits from 2021 onwards are retrospectively integrated, ensuring the inclusion of past achievements.

18. Skill development:

SSUS gives at most importance in the Skill development of Students in modern ways as well as traditional ways. Some of the courses include modern subjects like Informatics graphics, dimensional space design, new media, Stage Design, Play Production, Direction, Project Play etc. Where as in the traditional subjects, Manuscript studies, Translation studies, expertise in musical instruments, choreography of traditional dance forms and makeup for traditional artforms are also included in the Skill development courses, Communication skills in languages are also addressed. Counseling skills are attained by students of Psychology. Training for disaster management is provided through newly introduced project mode course in disaster management. 19. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

.Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit (SSUS) takes pride in its comprehensive integration of the Indian Knowledge system, promoting teaching in Indian languages, cultural studies, and the utilization of online courses. The university encompasses various departments that delve into the disciplines of Indian Knowledge, including Sanskrit, Indian languages, Indian art forms, music, theatre, and modern disciplines of social significance. Sanskrit departments such as Sahithya, Vedanta, Vyakarana, Nyaya, General, Department of Philosophy, and the International School for Sankara Studies (ISSS) play a vital role in teaching both Indian and Western philosophies. These departments (Except ISSS) offer postgraduate and research programs, fostering a deeper understanding of Indian systems of philosophy. Additionally, the Center for Vedic Studies focuses on research and promotes the significance of Vedic studies, while the Center for Buddhist Studies and the Center for Mimamsa Studies conduct collaborative programs and seminars with nearby institutions, garnering public support. The Sastrasamvardhini program is of great importance as it introduces students and teachers to Sastric texts of the Indian Knowledge system through specialized classes. Furthermore, the Faculty of Sanskrit Studies houses departments dedicated to Vastuvidya (Indian architecture) and Ayurveda (traditional Indian medicine). Vastuvidya offers a certificate course for the public, and the Ayurveda department offers diploma and PhD programs, contributing to the production of numerous doctoral scholars. The Fine Arts faculty offers programs in mural painting and sculpture, while the Department of Theatre includes ancient and modern subjects, including the classical Sanskrit theatre form of Koodiyattam. These programs extend up to the research level. Additionally, the university offers UG, PG, and PhD programs in classical dances of South India, namely Bharatanatyam and Mohiniyattam. The Department of Music provides programs in Indian classical music at the UG, PG, and PhD levels. Detailed syllabi for these programs can be found on the university's website. The successful completion of numerous PhDs from Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit serves as a testament to how the institution effectively integrates and nurtures Indian Knowledge systems, providing students with a holisticunderstanding of these disciplines.

20. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

.Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit places significant emphasis on Outcome-Based Education (OBE) in its PG and UG programs, as well as in its future plans for the PhD program. To ensure the effective implementation of OBE, the OutcomeBased Teaching-Learning and Evaluation (OBTLE) system was established in 2019 for PG programs and in 2020 for UG programs at SSUS. Furthermore, in 2023, OBE will also be introduced in the PhD program, showcasing the university's commitment to aligning all levels of education with this approach. To provide transparency and facilitate student learning, the university website offers access to the syllabi of courses, question papers from previous years, and the PG regulations. These resources allow students to familiarize themselves with the learning outcomes and assessment criteria of their respective programs. Interested individuals can visit the university website to access this information. Recognizing the importance of equipping faculty with the necessary knowledge and skills for implementing OBE effectively, the university conducted workshops specifically for the faculty members. These workshops aimed to introduce them to the new OBE system and familiarize them with its principles and practices. In addition to these workshops, regular training programs are conducted forteachers by experts in the field of OBE. These training programs ensure that faculty members stay updated on the latest developments and best practices related to OBE. The university's strong focus on OBE highlights its commitment to providing students with an education that is outcome-oriented, ensuring that they acquire the knowledge, skills, and competencies necessary for their future endeavors. Through the implementation of OBE and the continuous training and support provided to faculty members, SSUS strives to deliver highquality education and foster holistic development among its students.

21. Distance education/online education:

SSUS recognizes the importance of distance education and online learning, and has taken significant steps to facilitate these modes of education. SSUS has provided training to teachers in preparation for launching online courses. Moreover, the university has established a dedicated Center for Online Courses, namely, SSUS Centre for Online Learning (SCOL), and policies and regulations for online education have been developed. Two Online Courses Sanskrit for Ayurveda Teachers of Kerala University of Health Sciences and Basic Sanskrit Course in Malayalam for Public were successfully launched on 15.05.2024. To offer accessible and flexible learning opportunities, SSUS has taken initiatives to offer more certificate courses online. Additionally, classes on traditional sastras, organized by Sastasamvardhini, have been conducted online since the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic. To support the seamless delivery of online education, the IT wing of SSUS has developed an LMS system specifically tailored to meet the requirements of the university. The development of this LMS system has been recognized and awarded for its contributions to egovernance by the Government of Kerala. These initiatives reflect SSUS's commitment to expanding access to education and embracing technology-enhanced learning. By leveraging distance education and online learning methods, the university aims to provide students with greater flexibility in pursuing their education, irrespective of their geographical location. SSUS is dedicated to ensuring the quality and effectiveness of online education by providing training and developing robust policies and regulations for its implementation.

Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit (SSUS) integrates cross-cutting issues like Gender, Environment and Sustainability, Human Values, and Professional Ethics into its curriculum while promoting ancient knowledge systems. The university emphasizes the relevance of Sanskrit and traditional texts in modern education, ensuring these values permeate research, teaching, and learning. Gender, recognized as a complex social construct, is explored through classroom teaching, discussions, and extension activities. Departments such as Sanskrit Sahitya, History, Sociology, Social Work, and Geography offer courses addressing gender issues, supported by the Dakshayani Velayudhan Centre for Women Studies.

Environment and Sustainability are promoted through courses in Sahitya, Vyakarana, Vedanta, Nyaya, Geography, Sociology, and more, fostering awareness and sustainable practices among stakeholders. Human Values and Professional Ethics are emphasized through teachings from Indian Philosophy, Vedic Scriptures, and Classical Texts, with departments like Vedanta, Sahitya, and Comparative Literature offering specialized courses. Sanskrit Vedanta, Sanskrit General, Sahitya, Vyakarana, and Comparative Literature departments offer courses that impart human values and ethics. Furthermore, SSUS

promotes Shastraic Learning by providing opportunities for in-depth study of traditional Sanskrit texts. Students engage in reading original works, participate in scholarly discussions, and receive training from traditional scholars. SSUS also advances Shastraic Learning, encouraging in-depth study of traditional Sanskrit texts through activities like Salakapareeksha and Sasthrasamvardhini. The Centre for Disaster Studies uniquely integrates science and social science to understand natural hazards and socio-economic aspects of disaster risk reduction, blending scientific insights with policy-making for a holistic approach to disaster management.

SSUS conducts diagnostic assessments, including class tests and feedback sessions, to identify both advanced and slow learners. Based on the results, tailored programs are implemented to support both groups. Advanced learners participate in specialized workshops, research projects, and mentoring programs for intellectual growth, while slow learners receive remedial classes, peer tutoring, and skill development sessions to strengthen their foundational knowledge. Remedial classes are provided for the slow learners especially in English language for equipping them to use the language more efficiently. Following the the induction programmes for the UG and PG students, a dictation test is conducted for Sanskrit students, and those needing extra support are paired and assigned a teacher for additional sessions, including guided reading and sloka recitation. Advanced learners are trained and encouraged to participate in Vakyarthavichara, Aksharasloka sadas, and competitions organized by neighboring institutions. Senior students are motivated to engage in project work and apply for Aspire Scholarships. Competitive exam coaching, including UGC-NET and UPSC-SSC, is offered through the Career Guidance and Counselling Cell. A Student Counseling Cell (SCC) supports students' academic and personal challenges. Advanced learners are further motivated through Sanskrit scholarships and various endowments, ensuring their continued pursuit of excellence. These initiatives aim to nurture potential, enhance career prospects, and prepare students for academic and professional success.

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem-solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit emphasizes student-centric learning through diverse methodologies that enrich the educational experience. Experiential learning involves hands-on activities and real-life experiences, with each department organizing community camps, fieldwork, and specialized activities based on their programs. For Sanskrit students, Vakyartha Vichara, Salakapareeksa, and Subhashita chanting are integral, along with poetry recitations and comparative studies of Vedanta commentaries. Vyakarana students practice Sutra recitations and derivations from Prakriya texts like Siddhantakaumudi and Prakriyasarvasva, with Sutrakanthapatha and Dhatukanthapatha included in assessments. The Department of Music hosts recorded and live concerts, while Fine Arts students participate in exhibitions. The Department of Theatre regularly arranges theatre performances, blending traditional and modern approaches. Experiential and participative learning through community camps, PRA sessions, seminars, debates, and dialogues are core elements of the curriculum. Participatory learning methods include seminars, assignments, workshops, discussions, fieldwork, internships, quizzes, and writing competitions. The Departments of Geography, Centre for Disaster Studies, and Social Work assign students to seven-to-ten-day camps across Kerala for data collection. The Department of Social Work also conducts impactful initiatives like 'Sparsham 2k24' with the Block Resource Centre for differently-abled students. These dynamic strategies ensure interactive, holistic learning, equipping students with practical skills and preparing them for academic, professional, and societal excellence.

Faculty proposals are reviewed, and the University monitors project progress, manages accounts, and submits utilization certificates on time.

3.3 - Innovation Ecosystem

3.3.1 - Institution has created an eco-system for innovations including Incubation centre and other initiatives for creation and transfer of knowledge

The University has initiated the following facilities to ensure best teaching learning resources:

- The Technology Business Incubation Centre targets the manufacture of Fine Arts and Crafts objects and its sales under the brand name Rupakalpana. As an initial step, weaving machineries are also installed.
- The University has a Manuscript Repository under Strengthening of Sanskrit Studies to preserve palm leaf manuscript.
- The Department of Geography has a GIS and Remote Sensing Laboratory that provides facilities for Photogrammetry, Arial Photo Interpretation, Digital Image Processing and various spatial analyses. The Lab is equipped with Total Station and latest GIS, Remotes Sensing and Statistical softwares. Psychology Laboratory Provides an experimental platform for the students to collect data from human participants by utilising various psychological instruments.
- Recording Studio creates high quality academic content in both audio and video formats and provides facilities for recording various works. The studio comprises five recording booths and a central console room. It is a fully comprehensive suite ideal for pre-production, production, mixing, tracking and mastering. SSUS Centre for Online Learning (SCOL) has now been full-fledged by utilizing the facilities of the Recording Studio. Various courses like Basic Sanskrit Course in Malayalam hasbeen successfully run by the University.
- The Kerala Lalitha Kala Akademi Art Gallery is an in-house facility for curating art exhibitions. Five large studios with facilities for painting, preparation of colours, three dimensional design, printmaking, wood cutting and etching.

Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit (SSUS), Kalady, has a well-defined policy on consultancy, including a revenuesharing model between the institution and individuals, to encourage faculty participation in consultancy activities. Consultancy enables staff to apply their knowledge and expertise to benefit Government bodies, public sector organizations, non-governmental organizations, corporates, and community groups. These interactions enhance the University's teaching and research by bringing valuable insights, experiences, and networks gained through consultancy work. Moreover, consultancy services generate economic revenue for the University and the experts involved. The University actively supports consultancy initiatives aligned with staff responsibilities and institutional goals. Notably, consultancy activities have included six corporate training programs, such as the Higher Secondary School Teachers Transformation Programme (HSSTP) conducted by the Directorate of General Education, showcasing the diverse applications of consultancy in education. Additionally, as part of the MoU with the Kerala University of Health Sciences, a seven-day orientation program was organized for the Sanskrit Teachers of Kerala University of Health Sciences (KUHS) which was a notable consultancy conducted by the Institution during the year. Under the Centre for Disaster Studies, the University undertook a notable consultancy project titled Study on Akkulam-Veli Wetland Degradation and Consequent Flooding Susceptibility in Thiruvananthapuram City, commissioned by the Socio-Economic Unit Foundation. This initiative underscores the University's commitment to applying academic expertise to address pressing societal and environmental challenges.

One of the rooms, in each Department, is specifically devoted for audiovisual presentations, screening of documentaries and conducting workshops and training sessions of various types. Each Post Graduate classroom is provided with white boards, lectern, laptop/desktop computers for the exclusive use of students. LCD projectors are used for classroom lectures and students' presentations. Faculty members of all teaching Departments have been provided with laptop computers by the University to facilitate ICT enabled

teaching and learning. One classroom in every Department is converted into a smart classroom and provided with Jefferson chairs, an audio equipped integrated podium, storage for external hard disk, LCD projector, a dais, executive chairs and vertical blinds enabling screen projections. In addition to availing the facilities that are common to all teaching Departments, the Departments of Theatre, Music, Dance and Painting have classrooms specially designed to cater to the specific needs of those Programmes. A fully equipped Language Lab, a well equipped computer lab in the Department of History and GIS laboratory in the Department of Geography and a media centre for developing e-content.

The University has implemented a robust IT infrastructure across its campuses, ensuring uninterrupted internet connectivity. The Kalady campus benefits from high-speed internet connectivity provided through a project funded by RUSA. As part of this project, a Data Centre has been established, accommodating servers, firewalls, core switch, and router, with 24x7 functionality and backup power through redundant UPS.Additionally, campus-wide Wi-Fi and LAN connectivity have been set up, with 48 Wi-Fi access points installed throughout the campus, including hostels. The Web Centre, located in the Library Block, offers internet browsing facilities with 20 computers, while the Info-Net Lab, also with 20 computers, is exclusively dedicated to research students. Two computer labs in the Media Centre facilitate training sessions and academic ventures related to ICT, serving faculty members and students. The University has made significant efforts to equip each department and regional campus with smart classrooms. There are 22 smart classrooms at the headquarters in Kalady and 6 in regional campuses. Additionally, all PG classrooms in Kalady have computers, LCD projectors, and other necessary equipment. The University has provided institutional email IDs to faculty members, Ph.D. scholars, and administrative staff, promoting electronic communication as the official mode. The University has implemented various Online facilities including a student service portal, online attendance and internal mark entry system, online feedback system, online fees payment facility, faculty profile submission, blood donation forum, Online grievance facility, admissions and examination portals, remote access of journals, and more.

The SSUS has implemented a comprehensive policy to maintain and utilize its physical, academic, and support facilities. The infrastructure maintenance is divided among various sections, each with distinct responsibilities. The Estate Section, led by the Estate Officer, oversees the stock of assets, procurement of necessary items, and renewal of AMCs for computer systems. The Engineering Wing, headed by the University Engineer, ensures electrical, civil, and plumbing works with the support of qualified staff. The ICT Division plays a crucial role in maintaining computers, providing internet facilities, and offering technical support for software updates. They also manage laboratory facilities in specific departments, ensuring regular repairs, maintenance, and upgrading of equipment. The Central Library is maintained by the Deputy Librarian and a qualified team, coordinating with the Estate Officer and System Administrator. They oversee the maintenance of books, journals, furniture, and electronic equipment. Additionally, they have a dedicated section for visually disabled individuals. The Sports Complex, under the control of the HoD, is supported by a groundsman-cum-marker who prepares the ground and maintains the facility. The blackboards, electrical fittings, furniture and other equipments are regularly maintained by the Estate office & Engineering wing. - 1. The Kerala State Audit Department, the Audit wing under the Finance Ministry of Kerala, is the Statutory Auditors University under section 38 (3) of SSUS Act 1994. A unit of the State Audit Department is permanently functioning in the University Campus since 2010 and conducts concurrent audit in addition to the annual audit of the accounts of the University.
- 2. The University takes necessary steps to place the Annual Report, Annual Accounts and Audit Reports before the Kerala Legislative Assembly through the Higher Education Department Kerala as per Section 38 (10) of SSUS Act 1994.
- 3. The Accountant General Kerala has also been conducting audit of the accounts of the University every financial year under section 14 of the Comptroller and Auditor General's (DPC) Act1971 and submit the Report for compliance.

6.5 - Internal Quality Assurance System

6.5.1 - Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has contributed significantly for institutionalizing the quality assurance strategies and processes by constantly reviewing the teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals

The Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) plays a pivotal role in enhancing the academic quality of the institution through continuous review of teaching-learning processes. Comprising senior faculty, IQAC regularly submits AQAR and NIRF data, holding meetings to discuss reforms in academics, evaluation, and research. It analyzes NIRF performance and implements measures to improve scores in research and professional practices.

IQAC promotes research proposals to ICSSR, ICPR, and other projects, honors faculty and student achievements, and organizes induction and training programs for students and staff. It conducts seminars, orientation programs, and collects feedback from students to enhance curriculum quality. Initiatives like the SSUS Centre for Online Learning and Centre for Academic Writing reflect its forward-looking approach.

The cell ensures implementation of UGC regulations and conducts Gender, Energy, Green, Academic, and Administrative Audits. In collaboration with the Students Counselling Cell, it organizes quality improvement sessions, such as "Rules of Relationship" on World Mental Health Day. It also facilitated the implementation of the Academic Bank of Credits from 2023-24. IQAC remains committed to fostering excellence and sustainability in academics, research, and institutional practices.

6.5.3 - Incremental improvements made for the preceding during the year with regard to quality (in case of first cycle) Post accreditation quality initiatives(second and subsequent cycles)

The University has launched several quality enhancement initiatives. It introduced Multidisciplinary Dual Main Masters Programme in Disaster Management and Mitigation (DMM) and a PG Diploma in Sanskrit Computational Linguistics, reflecting its commitment to innovative project-based courses.

The Office of International Affairs, established per UGC norms, has framed regulations for academic collaborations with foreign institutions. Steps are underway to collaborate with the European Commission for an international student exchange program. The Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) was established, and students' credits since 2021 have been recorded.

The SSUS Centre for Online Learning (SCOL) was created to offer Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs) for students and the public, with two courses currently available. New Memoranda of Understanding (MoUs) were signed to enable industrial training, project work, and multidisciplinary collaborations.

Digital transformation efforts include the implementation of the University-developed FMTS software for file management, NIC software in the Finance Branch, and the digitalization of exam-related activities. Additionally, steps are being taken to implement the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUGP) aligned with the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, beginning with the 2024-2025 admissions. These initiatives aim to enhance academic quality, innovation, and operational efficiency across the University.

Best Practice: Counseling Scouts - The Psychological First Aiders

Objectives of the Practice

- To help students understand the importance of counseling for mental well-being and academic success.
- To create a network of trained student representatives called Counseling Scouts in every department.

The Context Students face personal, academic, and social challenges impacting their mental health, unaware of or hesitate to approach professional counselors. The Students' Counseling Cell (SCC) launched the Counseling Scouts program where selected students from each department act as a bridge between their peers and SCC to connect students to professional support.

The Practice

Selection of Counseling Scouts:

• Chosen for their approachability, empathy, and responsibility, including regional campus students.

Training of Counseling Scouts:

• A one-day session covers acceptance, communication, empathy, confidentiality, professionalism, and emotional management.

Roles and Responsibilities:

• Represent student concerns, guide peers to professional counseling, promote SCC services, and provide peer support.

Functioning and Monitoring:

• Supervised by the University Counselor with monthly reviews, including remote participation from regional campuses.

Evidence of Success

- Improved counseling awareness and accessibility.
- Increased student participation in SCC services.

Problems Encountered

• Mental health stigma, limited awareness, and geographical challenges.

Resources Required

• Training, budget, professional counselors, awareness campaigns, and support systems.

Faculty were trained in online teaching methodologies, and foundational courses such as Sanskrit for Ayurveda Teachers and Basic Sanskrit Course in Malayalam for Public were developed and successfully launched. SCOL also encourages dialogue on strategies to enhance student learning and ensure accessibility, reinforcing its commitment to meeting the evolving needs of learners regardless of location or time constraints. This initiative reflects SSUS's dedication to fostering academic excellence through innovative digital platforms.
