Details of State Of Art Lecture Series On Upanisad Darsana

- 1. A State of Art lecture series was conducted in the Department of Vedanta on 'Upanisad darsana' for the benefit of students and teachers of the university. It also aimed to make awareness of upanisads to people who are not familiar with the same. It mainly focussed on *Dasopanisads*. The first lecture was delivered by Prof. R.Vasudevan Potti, who was honoured by the President of India for his contributions to Sanskrit, on 28.2.2003. He discussed the origin and developments of Vedic literature especially upanisadic literature giving importance to Isavasyopanisad. 122 participants were present and a detailed discussion was carried out on conclusion of the lecture which was worthy and beneficial to the participants.
- 2. The 2nd lecture was delivered on 20th Feb 2003 on Kenopanişad by Dr. K.P.Babudas, a well known Sanskrit scholar from Deapertment of Sanskrit, Srī Śankara College Kalady. 73 participants were present. The lecture was highly beneficial to the participants. There was also a discussion after the lecture in which there was an active participation.
- 3. On 30th June 2003 there was a lecture on Kathopanisad by Prof. K.N.N.Elayath, Prof. of Sanskrit Vedanta, University of Calicut. 102 participants have attended the lecture, which was beneficial to all.
- 4. On 30.6.2003 a lecture was delivered by Dr. V Sisupalapanicker, on Taittiriyopanişad. He discussed the relevance of Upanisads especially Taitiriopanisad in this era. There were 100 participants.

- . 5. On 23.7.2003 Dr. K.Maheswaran Nair, Prof. of Sanskrit Vedanta, University of Kerala on Chandogyopanisad. He has given a general outlook on Chandogyopanisad and it was fruitful to the participants. There were 76 participants.
- 6. On 29.9.2003 Dr. B Chandrika Reader, Dept of Vedanta, SSUS Kalady has delivered a lecture on Māndūkyopaniṣad. She has discussed about the significance of Māndūkyopaniṣad among dasopanisads. 64 participants were present and were fully satisfied with the lecture and the deliberation on conclusion.
- 7. On 23.102003 Swami Tatwamayananda delivered a lecture on Bṛhadāraṇyakopaniṣad. He discussed about the importance of the Upanisadic mantras especially the Bṛhadāraṇyakopaniṣad which is the biggest one among Daśopaniṣads.

University level Workshop

- 1. Department of Vedanta conducted a University level workshop on common/methodology courses for undergraduate programme on 15th and 16th October 2009. It helped the teachers of this university in restructuring the syllabus of common /methodology course. Model question papers were also prepared by the teachers who have participated in the workshop. 122 teachers were present.
- 2. Workshop on informatics was conducted in two phases for the benefit of teachers of the university. The first phase was held from 20th June to 1st July 2011 which was co-ordinated by Dr P.Chithambaran, HOD Deapertment of Vedanta. It was purely based on the theoretical aspects of informatics which are included in the B A. Syllabus. The second phase was conducted from 9th to 13th August 2011. It was on applications of informatics which was useful in acquiring the practical knowledge in computer.

3. A five day workshop on Re- structuring of undergraduate courses

As the instruction of Higher Education Department, a five day workshop was conducted on Re- structuring of undergraduate courses. It was co-ordinated by Dr.P.Chidambaran, H.O.D Deapertment of Vedanta. The workshop was on two phases consisting of 3 days in the first phase in which 134 teachers have participated and 2 days in the second phase where 66 teachers attended. In this workshop, the syllabi have been restructured and also the annual system has been totally changed into credit and semester system. The system in Kerala was first introduced by this university.

Eminent scholars like NirmalaPanicker, Prof.K.P.Babudas, Dr.G. Ramamurthy, Sreelekha Panicker, O Maheswari etc., and delivered lectures on various aspects of restructuring. It was fruitful and beneficial to the participants.

An Advance Workshop on renowned Advaita Vedanta texts was conducted by the department for ten days from 2-11November 2011 Details of National and International Seminars Conducted by the Department.

Vedanta and Modern Society:

The Department has conducted several National Seminars so far. In 1999, a Seminar on *Vedanta and Modern Society* was organized by the Department. Distinguished scholars from the state of Kerala

participated in the Seminar and presented scholarly papers. National Seminar on Comparative Philosophy (1st 2nd 3rd March 2000)

- 1. In spite of the astonishing developments in the field of science and information technology, the humanity as a whole faces several challenges while it is generally believed that a holistic approach in the field of philosophy will pave a new way for a peaceful life on planet earth. A comparative and interdisciplinary approach in the studies of various systems of philosophy at global level is the need of the hour. The new millennium seems to hold great potential for the philosophical awakening of the entire humanity. The University established in the name of the illustrious Indian Philosopher Sri Sankaracharya has a vital role in organizing several new interactions in the field of philosophy and to champion the cause of a comparative and holistic approach.
- 2. A three day *National Seminar on Comparative Philosophy* had been organized by the Department in March, 2000 at Kalady. Eminent scholars from all over India and from abroad participated in the Seminar and presented scholarly papers. It threw light on the various aspects of comparative and interdisciplinary approaches in the various systems of Indian philosophy which is an asset to the world of intelligential. Dr. P. Chithambaran, Professor and Head of the Department, was the Coordinator of the Seminar.

Famous critic, orator and the former Vice-Chancellor of the University of Calicut, Dr. SukumarAzhikode inaugurated the Seminar. In his inaugural address, Dr. Azhikode clearly expressed the present position of the various philosophical systems, especially that of Vedanta, in the new millennium. Various aspects of the different systems of philosophy, their social, religious, linguistic and philosophical relevance were discussed in the Seminar.

3. Advaita Vedanta –Problems and Prospects on 11th ,12th and 13th of March 2008

Advaita Vedanta provided only relative reality to this ephemeral world. At the same time, Brahman, the ultimate can be attained by seeing self – sameness i.e. by seeing the essence of one's self in all living and non-living objects.

Vedanta is one of the most celebrated philosophies among the different systems of Indian Philosophy. The Bramasutras, the Bhagavadgita, and the Upanishads constitute the basis of its teachings. These canonical texts are together called *Prasthanatraya*. Based on the different interpretations of these canonical texts there acrose different schools of Vedanta.

Acharya Sankara commented on these triple texts and established his philosophy of Non-dualism. Later commentators on Prasthanatraya tried to incorporate devotion in this theme.

Bhakthi aims at seeking for satisfaction of one's needs and wishes ultimately the Pramapurushartha. As per the Indian tradition every creature takes birth for attaining the highest goal of human existence i.e. liberation. Adi Sankara advocates knowledge of the Supreme Soul as the means of attaining this end. But the fact is that it is not an easy task for an ordinary person to attain Self-knowledge. So for uplifting less-gifted persons to the height of wisdom the easy method. Bhakti is being incorporated by certain commentators. It helps to develop a sense of awareness which dispells sorrows and pains. Hence it is advisable not only to the educated but also to the ordinary people.

Ramanuja [11th centur AD established his theme of qualified non-dualism treating Bhakti and Prapatti, the easy means of attaining salvation. Madhvacharya [12th century AD put forth his theory of Dvaita highlighting Vishnu as the Ultimate principle and Vishnubhakti as the means to liberation.

Nimbarka, Vallabha, Chaitanya Mahaprabhu etc. are other major system builders of Vedanta who adopted Bhakti as the easiest way to attain the Ultimate goal.

This Bhakti is different from worship and Upasana, It is the dedication of the devotee before the divinity. All such matters as Bhakti, Worship, Upasana etc are remaining as topics of great debate. Even Acharya Sankara has written more than 60 Stotra works hilighting the Bhakthi concept. For providing a common platform to the academics to discuss the various connotations of the concept of Bhakthi as per the different Acharyas a National Seminar was organized by the Department of Vedanta on the topic Bhakthi schools of Vedanta.

The audio / video documentation of the Jaiminiyasamaveda Nambootiri tradition of Kerala was carried out successfully by the School of Vedic Studies of the University. This documentation project has attracted the attention of the Vedic and Sanskrit scholars all over the world. Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts (IGNCA), New Delhi and some other agencies have purchased copies of the whole documented matter.

UGC Project of Preservation Techniques of the Chanting of Rgveda in Kerala was also successfully carried out by this centre. The project was to publish in Devanagari script the manuals in Mss/Tss on the preservation techniques of the Rgveda chanting of Kerala Most of the manuals of them are with the Vedic Scholars of Kerala, written in Manuscript or Transcript form. They were collected as part of the project and a volume has been published by Vedic Studies in 2010 as the outcome of the project.

Studies and researches in Vedic Knowledge are being conducted intensively in all Universities / academic institutions all over the world. Several areas are yet to be opened in this subject. There is much scope for interdisciplinary studies and researches based on Vedic texts related to the topics like history, philosophy, religious studies, theology, anthropology, psychology, Indian jurisprudence, philology, semantics, grammar, etymology, prosodial science, ecology and environmental studies and women studies. One who completes this course will be aware of the possibilities of Vedic Studies in the current scenario. Hence there are several academic opportunities in this area. What is urgently needed is to identify this centre as a full-fledged department and start research programmes. If such a step is not taken, it will be very painful to say that this centre will disappear in the recent future. It will not be easy to run the department without even a single permanent staff and without M. Phil and Ph. D. Programme. The Vedic tradition of Kerala in all the Vedas is well accepted by the Vedic scholars of the Universities of India as well as abroad.

Hence Sree Sankaracharya University has the responsibility to undertake studies and researches in the field of Vedic knowledge which itself is the relevance of developing this centre.

English had been the language of western colonialism. It, still, is the language of neo imperialism. It has now become the official and power language of global capitalism and its various manifestations in knowledge, communication and information sectors. The western centrism and hegemonic aspects of English are part of contemporary linguistic, literary and cultural reality. English has also monopolized the media and academia across the world.

The cultural homogenizing and erasing effect of English has seriously affected the indigenous linguistic cultures in the Asian and African countries. English has replaced the native languages and literatures in a serious threat to local cultures. English in the contemporary world is also an agent of westernization and Americanization.

But in cultures where the weight of antiquity still rules, the present English is a catalyst of social change. It is a medium of modernization and socio-political reformation. It becomes an instrument of democracy and human liberation. Traditional hegemony and priestly patriarchy are questioned and canceled through the egalitarian and modern worldview provided by this language that is a product of enlightenment and western modernity itself.

This is the relevance of English in countries like India having burdens of hegemonic past. Socio-cultural change, democratization and anti-imperialist upsurges can find their expression effectively in and through English. It can develop resistance against both western imperialisms and indigenous hegemony through derivative new discourses that are universal and expressive. Such derivative discourses are part of the alternative appropriation of the language in postcolonial contexts. The emergence of new 'englishes' across the world that challenge the western model and monopoly is a radical reversal of the old colonial power relations. These new idioms are now becoming the voices of the local cultures all over the world.

In the academic and epistemological discourses in the third world strategic and intelligent use of English is indispensable. The Department focuses on such alternative and counter hegemonic use of English in a broader cultural studies paradigm giving emphasis to other disciplines in the humanities and various Indian systems of knowledge.

In a postcolonial multicultural society like India, English Studies has the dubious distinction of being the colonialist discourse and the nationalist discourse at the same time. Conventional English teaching is widely known as English Studies Paradigm. It is a quadrupolar axis of relations in which the author and the reader are connected through the amorphous medium of language and the concrete medium of text: author-language-text-reader. It consists in extracting meaning through certain pedagogic practices. As language is a deceptively political medium, the reality represented in language is a language-specific reality which is politically coloured. As language is a medium capable of political appropriation, the text need not evoke the same emotive responses in the reader as was constructed in the author's psyche. This is especially true in the colonial context when the author is a representative of the colonizers and the reader a member of the colonized or vice-versa.

In the context of the political burden of language, Cultural Studies Paradigm has become an effective replacement to Literary Studies Paradigm. It is a quadrupolar axis in which the author is linked to the reader through culture and text: author-culture-text-reader. The cultural identities of the author and the reader are defined in terms of the cultural difference. This method consists in defining cultural identities of the author and the reader: the text acts as a transparent medium of cultural difference. The reading of the text is not confined to the quest for meaning, but to find one's position in cultural contexts. Language is never subordinated in this kind of study; language is an important determinant of cultural identity. Schools of English Studies all over the world are rapidly getting converted into Schools of cultural studies of multi-disciplinary composition.

In the globalized context of Language studies, language has lost many of its functions. The only function of language largely unaffected by globalization is the communicative function. India has already become an important destination for Educational Sources Outsourcing (ESO). In the changed scenario, proficiency in communication skills has become an essential qualification for employment. Irrespective of the discipline, mastery in communication enhances the employability of prospective candidates. Courses have to be designed in such a way as to cater to the essential contemporary needs of the students.

Class room lectures: These sessions covers the theoretical part of the syllabus. The objective of the sessions is to help the students gain a detailed knowledge dance, various theories of performance, modern stage and approaches etc.

Practical Sessions : As both the disciplines taught in the department are of performing nature, more thrust is always given on providing strict training during practical sessions in 'kalaris'.

Sanskrit Sessions: The learning of dance is incomplete without acquiring a basic knowledge of the ancient Sanskrit Texts written on Indian Dance, Music and Drama like Natyasastra, Abhinayadarpanam, Sangeetaratnakaram etc. So, there are separate sessions to provide elementary knowledge on Sanskrit language to the dance students so that they can understand these valuable texts and their interpretations with more clarity.

Cultural History Sessions: Art is a product of culture. Hence, it is important to know the past cultural history which provided a platform for the origin and evolution of various art forms that we see today. We engage faculties from history and other related departments to conduct sessions on Art and Cultural history which have been beneficial to the dance students in a great way.

Through Assignments: Every student is given assignment topics in every semester for each subject. Usually the topics for assignment submission will be from the prescribed syllabus, but in some cases not necessarily be so if the topics are of general nature. Student is expected to research upon the given topic and submit a written synopsis in the generally followed format within the stipulated time frame. Faculties evaluate the assignments give internal marks and grades; and in some instances ask the student to resubmit the same if any corrections are required.

Classroom Seminars: Like assignment submission, topics are given for Classroom seminars too. Later in the presence of HOD, the student is required to present it. The same is evaluated and given internal marks and grades.

Through Unit tests: At the end of every semester, external as well as internal examinations are conducted in each subject covered in the syllabus in that particular semester to evaluate the progress of the students.

Strengths

- The Department has a vibrant and talented faculty team with traditional and modern knowledge on the theoretical and practical systems of theatre arts.
- 2. Every year the department admits 10 gifted artists as the post graduate students based on the entrance and aptitude test and they are the greatest resource of the department ion the growth process.
- 3. The Department has developed a descent infrastructural facility for the smooth functioning of the Department.
- 4. The students and teachers together work for inter departmental and inter disciplinary collaborations in making the theater arts work contemporary and productive.
- 5. The students and teachers make their own creative works and productions every year and they in turn become great works of art.

Weaknesses

- 1. The insufficient infrastructural facilities are the most significant weakens of the department.
- 2. The department could not really develop its own theatre complex with a studio yet.
- 3. The students always find it difficult to wok freely in the current University time frames
- 4. The absence of sufficient full time regular teachers is also hindering the development of the department.
- 5. The department at present has no technical support for the production of new works.

Opportunities

- 1. Every student is supposed to develop own production every year and that gives chances to students to work independently.
- 2. Since the resources and infrastructures are limited, the students find alternative systems to experiment in the process and this is always a great opportunity for the department
- 3. The regular discourses and interactions with the internationally renowned scholars in the sector give opportunities in making more contemporary knowledge updating.
- 4. The general ambiance of the department is very encouraging and that gives the students more confidence in making innovations and experimentations.

5. The students who complete the programmes are always getting placements in the modern media productions and also they develop themselves as good professionals in the field.

Challenges

- The M. Phil theatre course provides a relevant learning opportunity for a diverse range of students as it lays an appropriate foundation for further study in theatre, performing arts and other related subjects.
- By instilling discipline, and refining communication and group-work skills, it offers a valuable course of study for students who may wish to pursue a career or further education studies in areas connected to theatre.
- Giving them the opportunity to develop and apply their skills in creating and performing theatre developing in them the attitudes and

approaches necessary to understand, appreciate and explore a variety of forms, practices and traditions.

- Giving them a knowledge and understanding of theatre as an art form across different cultures and historical periods.
- The new integrated M. Phil/Ph. D programme in Theatre with the help of practitioners and researchers of theatre will be a novel attempt in the sphere of research.

1.4 Aims:

Students who register for the M. Phil.-Ph. D. integrated programme in Theatre degree take a two semester core course (weekly sessions over 20 weeks), and may submit a dissertation (15 to 20 thousand words) for obtaining M. Phil. degree. The M. Phil. dissertation will enable students to demonstrate their ability to design and carry out original independent research drawing on appropriate methods of aesthetical enquiry. Thus it allows for a synthesis of the subject-specific elements of the degree with the more practice-oriented research skills. It will give practical first-hand experience in applying the principles of research design and carrying out advanced research using some of the techniques of visual documentation, data collection and analysis learned in the research training modules. This work will also serve as a bridge to a Ph. D. thesis proposal. The seminar course of the course-work is designed to develop communication skills needed to present research in contemporary Theatre.

Phil dissertation in social sciences will be chosen and awarded The Shameer Prize by the Foundation; and national seminars have been proposed to be held in the area dear to the late Shameer. It is largely with the co-operation of the students, scholars, and teachers of the Department that this Foundation has been conceived, registered and functions.

During the last eighteen years of its existence, the Department has been able to generate knowledge both within a regional and national historical perspective. Some of the areas that have been highlighted include: Rationalist Movement; Buddhist and Jain cultural geography; Social history of Muslim education; Aikya Kerala movement; Economic history of Princely Cochin; Royal family of Cochin and its cultural contributions; Human rights movement; Migration studies; Gender Studies; Peasant studies; tribal studies; pre-modern trade; Community formation and identity; and Urban geography. This knowledge base is spread out in the form of numerous Dissertations/Theses, research papers, articles, proceedings, monographs and the like:

51. Detail five major Strenghts, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Challenges (SWOC) of the department.

Strengths:

- 1. The Department is the biggest and at the same time the youngest teaching faculty of History in the Universities in Kerala in terms of the number of teaching staff, the number of students and research scholars, and in terms of its institutional history.
- 2. The stature of the Department in the only unitary University in Kerala devoted to the Humanities and Social Sciences—yet, with a truncated structure having physical presence in different quarters of Kerala, both rural and urban—enables it to cater to students from a wide area across Kerala and from diverse socio-economic background.
- 3. Faculty has immense potential for further academic consolidation by independent/individual scholarly pursuits as well as in terms of academic collaborations/platforms among themselves since there are many members who share more or less similar and often complementary themes of research in the modern socio-economic and intellectual history of Kerala.
- 4. The Department has identified and opened up hitherto untouched areas in the study of Modern Kerala History by initiating a very large number of micro-level inquiries in the form of dissertations at the Master's and Doctoral level, which can constitute the base/core of any attempt at

- producing the local and regional histories of Kerala, and change the way Kerala History has so far been portrayed.
- 5. The Department has been able to promote a free and liberal intellectual atmosphere that invites interaction possible among students, research scholars and faculty, which can now lead to possible combinations, collaborations, platforms and consortia.

Weaknesses:

- 1. Shortage of faculty to engage postgraduate students simultaneously at the Main Centre in Kalady, and at the four Regional Centres.
- 2. Lack of specialists from all the major branches of historical knowledge so as to initiate and supervise specialisations in the major branches/areas of Indian History.
- 3. Since the Department has at present more or less a truncated existence at five locations spread out in Kerala due to extra-academic considerations built into the fabric of the University, it finds itself located in one Main Centre and at four Regional Centres, and therefore, the essentially needed common focus and togetherness in spearheading academics is often difficult to mature and materialise.
- 4. The repetition of the same M.A. Programme without any change in specialisation in all the centres of the University; and the allocation of M. Phil scholars based at the Main Centre but under the supervision of faculty members who are based at stations outside the Main Centre of the University and located at a distance of nearly 100 kms away in some cases and more than 200 kms away in some.
- 5. Being the only Department of History in Kerala to have no office/administrative staff, the valuable time and energy of the faculty, especially of the acting-Head needs to be wasted for clerical and administrative functions instead of academic coordination and planning.

Opportunities:

- 1. The expertise in Sanskrit and related fields of knowledge available in the University combined with the knowledge base produced so far by the Department create an environment for meaningful inquiries into the multiple layers of the intellectual and sociocultural history of pre-modern society in India. This throws open more related opportunities as listed below:
- Knowledge of pre-modern scripts and manuscript traditions of Kerala can be linked up with the oral traditions in the wake of the local and regional historical knowledge-base produced by the Department.
- 3. The manuscripts languishing in the various Archives of Kerala can be contextualised by the Department by banking upon the collective expertise and input from the various faculties represented in the University.

- 4. The museumised objects and artefacts available in the various Museums in Kerala can be meaningfully put into proper historical and art-historical perspectives by the Department by banking upon the collective expertise and input from the various faculties represented in the University.
- 5. Some of the opportunities outlined above have been realised in a less explicit or specific manner though concrete action-oriented plans on the above four-points will have to be.

Challenges:

- 1. Attracting motivated students to strengthen the M.A. and Integrated M. Phil-Ph. D Programmes.
- 2. Restructuring of the courses so as to best represent the emerging fields of historical knowledge while still catering to the stakeholders largely from the rural background.
- 3. Finding financial assistance for the proposed future plans of the Department.
- 4. Convincing the University/Government of Kerala about the necessity of diversifying the faculty so as to enable the Department to take up the lead role in historical studies in Kerala in a holistic manner.
- Building an interdisciplinary academic consortium along with the disciplines represented in the University so as to explore historical experiences/themes of a multicultural and pluralistic society in Kerala.

52. Future plans of the department.

The Periyar River Basin, in which the Sree Sankaracharya University, Kalady, is located, in central Kerala, had been one of the earliest riparian human settlements in Kerala. The Department proposes to conduct a detailed survey of the evidences of man-made tools and artifacts right from the Pre-historic days through the Megalithic and early historic Iron Age, and the material culture from the early historic to the late medieval days along the course of the Periyar River. A preliminary survey conducted in this regard yielded rich results in this regard. The Department would museums these cultural remains in the proposed Museum for Periyar River Basin Studies along with archaeologists, historians and geologists, and initiate historical studies of the nature of this riparian culture centred on River Periyar.

Bringing out Caritam: Journal of Historical Studies

Introduction of specialisation at the Master's level by offering courses in Ancient History, Medieval History, and Modern History so as to be in tune with the best practices in the discipline in India and abroad.

The programme offered, M.A. Gender, Ecology and Dalit Studies, is a unique interdisciplinary Innovative Programme sanctioned by the UGC which is the first of its kind in India. All three major thrust areas of Gender, Ecology and Dalit Studies merge into the theoretical framework of New Social Movements, aiming at social transformation, which is one of highlights of the current academic scenario across disciplines. The curriculum and syllabi of the programme are well grounded in theoretical understanding and provide students an opportunity to build up knowledge through applying theoretical understandings of the classroom to the experience of ground realities acquired through rigorous fieldwork. Such fieldwork is an integral part of the Programme.

Strengths:

- 1. Provides for study of new social movements on an international level and expects to assist in social transformation at the community level.

Weaknesses

- 1. Students unable to locate an appropriate discipline in the UGC-NET exam. Rigid disciplinary compartmentalization should be overcome through introducing new innovative interdisciplinary areas in UGC-NET exam.
- 2. Conventional disciplines not ready to recruit these students due to lack of interdisciplinary consciousness in Indian academic research.
- 3. Insufficient fund for Fieldwork and Book Purchase

Opportunities

- 1. Since it is an interdisciplinary Masters Programme it can develop into a Centre for Interdisciplinary Research in New Social Movements.
- 2. International collaboration on Field Studies is possible.
- 3. The Programme can associate with regional, state, national and international projects on Development agendas.
- 4. The Programme can build up knowledge bases on the marginalised sections in order to inform state policies.
- 5. The Programme can associate with local groups and NGOs for effective struggles for social transformation

Challenges

- 1. The primary challenge is in convincing the University establishment about the strategic importance of this Masters Programme and in persuading the administration to let the Programme continue.
- 2. In a world of competing employment opportunities the immediate employability of this programme throws up challenges.
- 3. Balancing classroom studies with field activism is a challenge for both students and teachers.
- 4. Generating data about sensitive aspects of ongoing struggles is a difficult task and offers challenges.
- 5. Growing up into an independent Centre for Research with international collaboration requires consistent planning and strenuous efforts which are challenging.

The Department makes informal and formal evaluations and feedbacks on the curriculum, and teaching learning process. The department has regular

departmental meeting and evaluation practices of the curriculum. The department has revised the curriculum three times after the inception of the course. All the revisions are done on the basis of the evaluations and the existing system and model. The department also has done specific workshops to analyze the curriculum and teaching learning process incorporating the current developments in the sector to make it more effective.

b. students on staff, curriculum and teaching-learning-evaluation and how does the department utilize the feedback?: The teachers get feedback from the students on the curriculum and teaching learning activities. The department uses a specially designed feedback form from the students' community. The forms filled in by the students are used to analyse the relevance of the curriculum and also to get the readings of the students on the teaching and learning practices of the department. The teachers also engage in the informal discussions with the students and do the analysis on these matters and get the feedback.

The departments always in the opening of the semester and also at the end of the semester do an evaluation with the students about the semester programmes. This has contributed to revise and improve the teaching learning programmes and curriculum.

More over the students in the department are always motivated and appreciated in making their critical observations about the curriculum, Teaching learning process and the performance and involvement of the teachers. Many of the activities in the programme are in-house or residential in nature (Camps, Tours, Workshops etc...) and so the interaction possibility and close observation opportunities are very high. The departments also have a close effort of assessing and developing the skills of the students and thus make the students observations received on the teaching and learning activities.

c. alumni and employers on the programmes offered and how does the department utilize the feedback?:

The department in the Main centre and also at the regional campuses have structured alumni and the alumni are always consulted in many ways. They have instituted a memorial lecture in the department and always give their expertise support in moulding the new generation professional through extension lectures, workshops, field placement supports, job placement supports etc... The alumni also give critical observations and feedback on the curriculum and teaching practices. Many of the alumni are teachers in the University and also heading the departments in many other colleges and departments in Kerala. The syllabus of the Masters Programme has stated the programme objectives with the course details and the curriculum. These objectives of the courses as well as the programme are publicized in the Website and handbook. The students and teachers make detailed analysis on these objectives before the course and programme is started. Every semester the Department conducts a semester planning and discussions and the programme objectives along with the course objectives are also discussed in the meeting.

The teaching learning and assessment strategies are structured in a way that the learning outcomes are met with. The Department follows semester end examinations, along with the continuous internal evaluation systems to assess the learning standards of the students. The teachers make interactional and experiential discussions to make the objectives and learning outcomes assessed. The University has stipulated specific standards and grades for the assessment of the students with regard to each course in the programme. The students are given specific instructions timely and occasionally to make their responsibilities fulfilled. The Students are given with the mentoring, tutoring and other individualistic support systems to assess the achievements of the student's ion the teaching learning process. Regular departmental meetings are conducted and through these meetings the teachers are asked to ensure the progress of making the outcomes achieved. The levels of completion of the syllabus, reading materials availability, additional supplementations required for the students and teachers all are assessed and accordingly modifications are made. The examination department under the supervision of the Pro Vice Chancellor consolidates the final grade sheets and brings out the statistics before doing the result publication. Then the result will be taken to the University authorities and made authenticated before publication. The university publishes the results in the university website and further forwarded to the Departments and the Campus Directors for the dissemination top the students and concerned stakeholders. And the summary of results will come out with academic notes. In the academic council, results would be a point of discussion. Thus, the success of students in the current and previous years will be discussed. Remedial measures suggested will be implemented by the university. All these steps make the programme objectives and teaching learning objectives met and monitored.

3. Location of the campus and area:

Vanchiyoor is a locality in downtown Thiruvananthapuram city the political capital of kerala state. Vanchiyoor occupies an important place in the history of Travancore. It was the district headquarters and most important offices were situated there. There are a lot of heritage monuments in the area. I. Brief History of the Centre:

The inception of Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit, Kalady in 1993, was rather a belated translation into reality of a unique idea conceived by a committee in the early 1970s, headed by the late K.P. Achyuta Menon, a former Civil Servant and a Sanskrit Scholar in his own right. The University with its headquarters at Kalady, the birth place of Adi Sankara had a geographical spread throughout Kerala, including Thiruvananthapuram, the Capital city of *God's own country*. The city has occupied a pride of place for more than a century in the educational history of Kerala and it is only appropriate that it housed one of the early Regional Campuss of the University. The centre had a modest beginning in an approximately 2000 sq.ft rented building aptly named 'Nalanda' with the late Dr.

Poovattoor Ramakrishna Pillai, an eminent Sanskrit Scholar, as it's Director. The academic activities were set in motion with the department of Malayalam in full swing and others following at close heels. By 1994, the Centre could boast of eight fully functioning departments with facilities for Post graduate and research pursuits and about eleven under Graduate options.

With the acquisition of an own building at Vachiyoor and two more rented buildings within the city, the activities gathered momentum and many unique Courses were initiated. Besides post graduate courses in different disciplines of Sanskrit *viz.* Vyakarana, Vedanta, Nyaya and Sahitya, the Centre offered M.A. in Hindi, M.A. in Social Work, M.A. in History etc. The Under -Graduate Courses then introduced were Tripose B.A. which offered Sanskrit, Philosophy, Politics, Geography, History, Economics and English; B.A. B. Ed, a four year integrated course, Five year integrated B.A. in Fine Arts and B. Ed full time and part time programmes. All these courses had Sanskrit as compulsory subject in consonance with the objective of the University to impart Sanskrit knowledge to all the students. There was facility to pursue research programmes like M. Phil and Ph.D in all these subjects as well as in Tamil. There was also hostel facility for students coming from distant places.

The University also opened a department of Foreign Languages and was fortunate to have as its Dean, the late Dr. Bernard Fenn, a scholar with priceless knowledge of German, English and several Indian and foreign languages. He also took over as Campus Director of the Centre.

During that time, the Centre had the rare privilege of having eminent scholars who had immense wealth of teaching and research experience, alongside young teachers who were beginning their careers in the teaching profession. The faculty of those times was a rainbow of age, experience knowledge and maturity on the one hand and youthful enthusiasm on the other, which made the fledgling University centre a lively place to be in.

The euphoria was however marred by a brief spell of inclemency marked by litigation and professional uncertainties. But the light at the end of the tunnel was soon sighted. When dust and din settled down in 1998, the structure of academic programmes underwent a significant change. The B.Ed Courses were restricted to the main centre in Kalady, Tripose B.A. was replaced by B.A. Sanskrit and five year.B.A. Course was abolished. The post graduate courses were retained in the centre with M.A.English also being started in 2003. Credit and Semester system was also subsequently introduced by the University for P.G Courses. The Centre was successively led by Dr. S. Peerukannu, Dr. S. Sivadasan, and Dr. S. Rajasekharan, Dr. R. Vijayakumar, Dr A.Paslithil and is presently being steered forward by Dr. R. Vijayakumar.

This offshoot of the SSUS family suffered bereavement of one of our promising and beloved colleagues, Dr. A. S. Latha of the Department of Hindi in

January 2007. We also lost to providence three of our dear students Rocky, Sajin and Archana.

With the teaching / non-teaching staff numbering around fifty and student strength of 360, the Centre is a beehive of academic and extracurricular activities. It is regularly hosting National and International seminars on topics of contemporary relevance. Vidvatsadas in Sanskrit has also been held. Since 2011 we are organinsing Academic Workshops in December. Sports meet and Youth festival are also being conducted. Our students have won several accolades. Activities under the National Service Scheme are also carried on. It is also a matter of pride that the NCC students of this centre have participated in National Republic Day parade in New Delhi. The Centre has an active and contributing Parent Teachers Association. An Alumni Association of the centre has also been formed and is involved in diverse activities. A Career Guidance Centre to aid the students is also functioning. It also organized entry into service training programme and Remedial teaching programme for undergraduate classes. The democratic aspirations and potentials of the younger generation are being realised through an active and vibrant Students Union which organises co-curricular and academic activities. Study -tours and excursions are frequently undertaken to various places of interest.

The Centre has some infrastructural facilities, albeit minimal, like a library with around 20,000 books. The building was constructed utilising the money made available from the fund of the Member of the Legislative Assembly representing the constituency. We also have a computer centre with ten terminals. Recently a vertical extenstion of 1000 sq. ft. have been completed above the library building. A lot more needs to be done in improving infrastructural facilities.

We have a smart classroom with ICT facility. In addition to this there is a portable projector and PAS.

Individually as well as collectively, the Centre has come far from the days of its inception. It is an honour for the Centre that some of its teachers have won titles, prizes and awards at the National and State level, for diverse achievements. Teachers have also undertaken UGC projects. The UGC has also recently approved the proposal for starting a P.G. course in Kerala Responsible Ayurvedic Tourism Education and Research, an innovative, inter -disciplinary programme. The Centre also carried out an extremely satisfying expedient of including the legendary honouring five Sanskrit Stalwarts M.H.Shastrigal, Prof.R.Vasudevan Potty, Prof.P.P.Ramakrishna Pillai. Dr.Poovattoor Ramakrishna Pillai, Dr.R.Karunakaran It was a duty well done at the right time

II. Extra Curricular Activities:

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME

The National Service Scheme started in SSUS, RC Thiruvananthapuram during the academic year 1997-1998. Dr.M.Manimohan, and A.S.Latha were appointed as programme officers. 169 students joined as NSS volunteers at that time. The programme officers had concentrated on regular activities like road making, cleaning programmes in the campus and Hospitals and also on organizing different seminar programs. The Programme Officer Dr.M.Manimohan continued his duty till 2000 in NSS. After that Dr.G.Ramamoorthy took over the charge as Programme Officer from in M.Manimohan, A.S.Latha continued as Programme Officer till her death in 2006. They lead the NSS as a team.

Dr.G.Ramamoorthy and Dr.A.S.Latha jointly organized special camp for volunteers at Kattayikkonam in Thiruvananthapuram District in Kerala during the academic year 2002-03. About 100 volunteers from two units of NSS participated in that camp. Every year they organized regular activities, seminars, Blood donations, camps etc.

During the academic year 2003-04 the Programme Officers organized SP camp in Vellarada (A forest area) in Thiruvananthapuram. One hundred and five volunteers participated in the camp. Colony road making, other cleaning works, seminars and cultural activities were the important items in the camp. During the academic year 2004-05 the strength of NSS volunteers was only 102. So, the special camp was organized jointly with Thuravoor centre of SSUS in Alleppy District in Kerala. It was held at Pattanakkad UPS in Vayalar. There was only one NSS unit in the academic year 2005-06.

Dr.Ramamoorthy handed over the charge of NSS to Dr.C..Poulose on 8th October 2006. Only the regular activities and seminars were arranged in the same academic year. 2006 .Dr. G. Ramamoorthy handed over the charge of programme officer to Smt .Rahila Beevi, M.I, Asst.Director in Physical Education. In October 2007 she handed over the charge of programme officer to Dr.C.Poulose and the programme officer of the second unit was Dr. H. Shylaja. In October 2010.Special camps and awareness classes were conducted for NSS volunteers, campus cleaning and beautification programmes were also conducted. No: of volunteers in both units- 200Nos. Smt.Rahila Beevi took the charge of programme officer of NSS unit no.1 and Dr.Sajila.N.R of the 2nd Unit.

CAREER GUIDANCE BUREAU

Since 2002 career guidance bureau centre has been functioning in the centre with the motto of providing better carrier guidance to the students. Moreover the centre is providing UGC coaching and entrance guidance. The centre is working under the direct control of the Director. Now days the students are using this centre in order to prepare for other competitive examinations also. The centre is working without any finical assistance and is not collecting any fee from the students for this service.

STUDENTS UNION

There is a student union working in the centre for providing leadership qualities and conducting various socio-cultural and extracurricular activities of the students. They are conducting Arts festival every year and the winners of each item will participate in the University level competition. Thus many prizes were secured by the students of the centre during the last few years at the University level. They also invite eminent personalities of the country for lecturing on various issues of the society. The members of the students union are being elected by the students through democratic process.

NATURE CLUB

A nature club for creating environmental awareness among the students is working in this centre since 2005. This is under the supervision of a teacher-incharge and assisted by non-teaching staff of this centre. The co-ordinator of the nature club is a student representative. At present, Dr.A.Paslithil, senior scale Lecturer in History Department of this centre is acting as the Teacher in charge and Sri. Shafeek, second semester MA student is the co-ordinator of the Nature club. About 75 students and all the teaching and non-teaching staff are the members of the club. A number of environmental awareness programmes were conducted in this centre under the nature club. Eminent personalities from various fields took classes. Various environmental issues were discussed during the classes. Study tours were also conducted in various ecological and biodiversity areas.

Department of Malayalam wish to start courses on some special areas such as literary historiography, classical study of arts and film critics in PG courses. The playing area of this centre is very limited and moreover the students of this centre are day scholars and they are utilizing the ground facility 2 kilometers away from this centre. The department cannot function properly because of the lack of facilities. I. History of the Campus:

Panmana has carved a special niche in Indian culture. It is the birth place of Agamananda Swamiji who propagated the learning of Sanskrit for the first time in Kerala in a democratic manner. The tomb of Chattambi Swamikal, the spiritual exponent of Dravidian language and culture, is also situated at Panmana. The Regional Campus started at panmana, the Merging place of Dravidian- Sanskrit Renaissance thoughts, in a way can be considered as the succession of it. The author of the first epic in Malayalam, Shri. Azhakath Padmanabha Kurup's learning Campus, Kottur Kalari, was in Panmana. The single teacher school started in 1911 by Shri. From 1994 onwards the Campus is functioning in an old two storied building owned by the University itself. This Campus owns a property of 28 cents in the campus where it functions currently and 40 cents at Peroor, near Ettumanoor. The Campus is situated 67 kilometres away from the Headquarters of the University, Kalady.

From 2003 onwards Credit and Semester system was introduced by the University. Mode of admission to these courses is through a common Entrance Test conducted by the university. At present, there are three P.G. courses offered in the Campus, M.A. Sanskrit Sahitya, M.A. Hindi and M.A. Malayalam. These courses are under the Credit and Semester system.

It was noticed that students often skipped their lunch which prevented them from remaining fully attentive in class during the afternoon session. Under the enthusiastic initiative of Dr. G. Baiju, a student of our M.A. Malayalam Degree Course, a Lunch meals programme got commenced on an experimental basis during the previous academic year, which has proved to be a welcome change and a great success. A cook prepared the lunch (porridge with vegetable side dishes). Both students and some members of the staff partake of the lunch programme. This programme is efficiently run with the small donation from parents and teachers. As a part of this programme our students also cultivate vegetables (green gram, Yam, ladies' finger, tomato, banana, tapioca etc.) in our campus under the table supervision and guidance of Dr. G. Reghukumar. These vegetables too are used for the preparation of various dishes to students. Thus valuable lessons on self-reliance too are imbibed by our students unconsciously by making a positive use of our land otherwise lying waste.

This Lunch meal programme benefits our students in multifarious ways - to improve their health, to prevent wastage of excessive money spent in restaurants and also to concentrate whole-heartedly in the learning process.

I. History of the Campus:

20

The Regional Campus at Alappuzha district, in particular Thuravoor (Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit) began functional in 1995. Between Ernakulam and Kollam district there is no Higher Educational Institutions emphasizing on the PG courses. Thuravoor is a socially and economically backward location of Aroor Assembly Constituency. Thuravoor has a historic tradition of presence of GSB and has ancient Mahadeva temple with mural paintings. There is a very strong Sanskrit tradition also. As it is a coastal and rural area Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit opens a new window for higher education.

At present a total number of 185 students are studying in B.A. (Sanskrit sahitya), M.A. (History, Malayalam & Sanskrit Sahitya) and MSW courses. There are 7 regular teachers and 17 guest lecturers working in different departments of the Campus. Eight members of the non-teaching staff are working in the Regional Campus. The library at the Regional Campus holds a good collection of books in different subjects. The rented building housing the Regional Campus has 10 classrooms, an office room, a staff room, the Director's room and a library. The Campus has a National Service Scheme Unit, with 100 enrolled student volunteers under a Programme officer. Our students have performed well in Inter—Campus Kabbaddi championships 2007-08 and got selected to the University team.

An actively functioning PTA and Alumni very efficiently supports the Campus in all its endeavours.

The only UniversityCampus in Alappuzha District functioning on Government fee structure, Regional Campus, Thuravoor is a home away from

home for the aspiring students coming from poor financial background. Most of the students here come from very poor families of coir-factory workers, agricultural labourers and fishermen. They cannot afford the escalating fees in private colleges and self- financing institutions. For them the existence and the continuance of the Regional Campus at Thuravoor is a heart- felt necessity. It was this feeling that was voiced at the all-party meeting convened on 21-02-2008. Expedient steps have been initiated to procure the required 3 acres of land to accommodate the Regional Campus and it is earnestly expected that in a near future, the Campus can be provided with all infra-structural conveniences with the help of University, UGC, MLA & MP funds.

II. Extra Curricular Activities:

NATIONAL SERVICE SCHEME

Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit, Regional Campus Thuravoor has one NSS unit. It comprises of 110 volunteers. The unit has two volunteer secretaries and one Programme officer. The unit has undertaken various activities in the field of social welfare. Two special camps and a number of one day and two-day camps were conducted under the NSS unit.

The volunteers showed keen interest and enthusiasm for conducting different social welfare and community development programmes under the NSS family. They participated in the rehabilitation works in the Tsunami affected areas of Andhakaranazhi and provided the collected dress materials and food to the victims. And they planted mangrove trees near the seashores for protecting them from the Tsunami in future. Bichu X.Malayil was the programme officer, She got **Vrukshamithra Puraskar** from Social forestry Department , Government of Kerala. During the special camps they constructed a mud road for the community people. The NSS volunteers keep a warm relationship with the community people.

NSS unit observed important days like NSS day, Republic day etc. Various classes were conducted during the ten-day camp on different topics like AIDS, Legal Literacy, Personality Development, Environmental Protection, etc. The volunteers actually participated in the various awareness campaigns arranged by local self-bodies against Chikun Gunia and other water related diseases. The volunteers took part in different seminars conducted by the different Universities in the state. Now the unit is functioning in an effective manner.

SPORTS ACTIVITIES

In spite of the absence of a physical education teacher and other conveniences such as play ground and sports equipments, our students have

participated and performed well in the Inter -Campus Championship conducted by our University at MainCampus, Kalady and other Regional Campuss. In the last year the Inter -Campus Kabaddi Championship was conducted at our Regional Campus. Our team got 2nd place in the tournament and 3 players of ourCampus were selected to the University Kabbadi team. Kum.Sanimol K.S.,6th semester B.A. student was declared as Individual Champion (Lady) in the University Athletic meet 2012-13.

PARENT TEACHER ASSOCIATION

The Parent Teacher association of the Campus actively takes part in all the matters relating to the Campus. Acting as a link between students and teachers and extending timely financial support for the regular activities and Campus programmes, PTA makes its presence felt in all walks of the campus life.

I. History of the Campus:

I. History of the Centre:

Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit is a statutory educational Institution constituted by Govt. of Kerala in 1993. The Regional Campus Tirur is one of the earliest regional centers established by the University. The Regional Campus started functioning in temporary building near Thunjanparambu at Tirur during November 1993 with courses at Post Graduate and Under Graduate level. The centre is located in the area having great historical and cultural relevance. In the beginning the following courses were offered at this centre but many of them discontinued due to lack of infrastructural facilities.

- 1. BA. Triple Main-Sanskrit, History and Philosophy combination
- 2. BA. Triple Main-Sanskrit, History and Political Science combination
- 3. MA Malayalam
- 4. MA Sanskrit Sahitya
- 5. MA Sanskrit Vyakarana
- 6. PhD in Malavalam
- 7. PhD in Sanskrit
- 8. B.Ed Malayalam
- 9. B.Ed Social Studies
- 10. B.Ed Sanskrit

This centre could provide quality education to the students from the socially and economically backward areas of Malappuram district. The main deterrence for the development of the centre was non-availability of required extent of land for the construction of building. This hindrance was

overcome when the benevolent and generous personality of Tirur Mr. P Padmanabhan Alias Unni (Manager, Navamukunda Higher Secondary School, Thirunnavaya) donated three acres of land in Thirunnavaya near the school.

As a result of devoted effort by the Centre Development Committee foundation stone for the Academic Complex was laid by Sri. E T. Muhammed Basheer, Hon'ble Minister for Education on 25th July 2006 in the presence of Hon'ble Vice Chancellor Dr. K S. Radhakrishnan and Registrar Dr. S Premjith.

In June 2007, Sri M A Baby, Hon'ble Minister for Education opened the building for the student community. The new Academic Block was named "Padmanabhan Nair Memorial Academic Block" in commemoration of the father of Sri. Padmanabhan Alias Unni. The name was announced by Sri. Paloli Muhammed kutty, honorable Minister in a function presided by Dr. K S Radhakrishnan, Hon'ble Vice Chancellor of the University.

V. Future Planning:

Though few new educational institutions are coming up in Malappuram, a backward District of Kerala most of them are focusing on Science and technology. As an institution that is concentrating in research on humanities the existence of TIRUR centre of Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit is very crucial. The existing departments have to be strengthened zeroing in on literature, arts, and

I. History of the Campus:

Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit Regional Campus, Koyilandy, is one of the four Campuss embodied in the first statute of the University. The Campus is - situated in a populous rural area by name Nambrathukara of the Keezhariyur Grama Panchayath at Koyilandy Taluk in Kozhikode District. The main source of student's intake for the University Campus is the rural area: moreover, it is worth-noting here that there are only a few undergraduate colleges in Koyilandy and its neighbouring areas where the students can resort to for higher education. Therefore, the Regional Campus, Koyilandy of the S.S.U.S stands out as the only important institution at this socially and educationally backward area where the students can resort to for higher education and research.

This Campus came into existence in 1994. Since then it has been functioning in a rented building. Then only two courses, i.e., M.A Sanskrit Sahitya and M.A Malayalam were offered in the beginning. Gradually many other courses including M.A in Vedanta, Hindi, Urdu, B.A Five year programme, Four year B.A B.Ed, Three year B.A inter-disciplinary programme, having a variety of subjects like Economics, Geography, History, Philosophy, Malayalam, Sanskrit, Hindi, Urdu were offered at the Campus apart from B.Ed and M.Ed courses. The facilities for research leading to M.Phil and Ph.D programes were also provided J at the Campus. Nearly Nine hundred students were annually enrolled at the Campus for different courses. Hostel and boarding facilities were also provided.

In course of time, the Campus was forced to terminate many of the courses offered in the Campus, i.e., B.Ed, M.Ed, Five year B.A, B.A B.Ed, and M.A Hindi. Research facilities were also done away with. Many of the subjects like Economics, Geography, once offered at the Degree level, were also done away with. This was due to the change of policies of the University and introduction of new-rules and regulations by the N.C.T.E. The financial stringency of the University led to the winding-up of the hostel facilities too, thereby reducing the strength of the students to 350 from 900 in the year 2001.

The essential things required for strengthening the Campus are mainly land and building. With this view in mind, the then authorities tried to purchase a plot of 20 acres of land for the Campus. Unfortunately, the Endeavour was hampered by a court case that intervened. This unpleasant situation badly affected and delayed the progress of the Campus. Fortunately, the present authorities have succeeded in procuring plots of 16.62 acres for the Campus and have started the construction of Academic and administrative blocks.

The Campus at present functions in a rented building. It offers four P.G courses in Sanskrit Sahitya, Vedanta, Malayalam and Urdu. M.Phil - Ph.D integrated programme in Urdu as well as B.A inter-disciplinary course are also offered here, in which Sanskrit Sahitya, Vedanta and General are offered as Core subjects. Sanskrit, Hindi, Malayalam and Urdu are offered as common courses for the .programme. The Campus has its own identity in that it is the only Campus that offers P.G course and research in Urdu in the whole Kerala. The department of Urdu of Sree Sankaracharya University of Sanskrit is situated here. Therefore, the Campus deserves much care and attention from the side of the authorities concerned.

The University has sanctioned a new Girls Hostel to the Campus. It started to function in a rented building in 2012 at Naduvathur, Keezhariyur Grama Panchayath, very close to the new campus.

Two NSS units are functioning in this Campus under the dynamic leadership of two programme officers. Both units have organized various social service activities which includes annual 7 day campus.

EART - A STAFF CULTURAL FORUM

A cultural forum of the whole staff of this Campus is functioning in the Campus. It came into being in- 2002. Former Vice Chancellor of the University Dr.K.N.Panicker inaugurated it. Since then this forum has actively involved itself in different cultural, social, academic and philanthropic activities. It has succeeded in creating a feeling of oneness among the staff.

P.T.A

There has been an active P.T.A Committee functioning at this Campus right from the beginning. This committee has carried out many commendable activities. It provided funds for putting up class rooms, providing drinking water facilities and sports kit.

I. History of the Campus:

Payyannur is named as one among the first Brahmin settlement villages of Kerala. It was a temple village earlier, as the famous Subrahmanya temple related to the name of Parasurama is situated here. As pre scholars, the temple has been beautifully narrated in the oldest Purana book, Brahmandapurana and the oldest Sanskrit text, Mushikavamsa of Atula, was written in this land. This place is very famous as it is the birth place of many Sanskrit Scholars, like Potera Ezuttacchan, Anitil Ezuttacchan , Karippath Ezuttacchan, Trippanikkara poduval, Sankaranathanunittiri etc. The oldest poem of Malayalam, namely Payyanur Pattu is also related to this land. The Regional Campus of Sree Sankaracharva University of Sanskrit started functioning on 18th June 1995 and Dr.E.Sreedharan, lecturer, Sanskrit Sahitya was posted as Campus - in - Charge. At the beginning, the Campus provided eight P.G. Courses (Sanskrit Sahitya, Vyakarana, Vedanta, Malayalam, Hindi, History, Social Work and Jyothisha) and two U.G. Courses of tri-pauce pattern (Sanskrit- Philosophy- History, Sanskri-Econocics- Politics). Formal inauguration of the Campus was done by
